Scour refers to the loss of streambed material during floods, and it's the foremost cause of bridge failure in the United States. In Alaska, glacial rivers with shifting channels, outburst floods, ice jams, and debris all present challenges for scour prediction and design. A number of bridges within Alaska are considered "scour critical," meaning that either engineering calculations or observations have determined that there is a potential for the bridge to lose sta
